The Visiting Nurse Association has been active in Dallas for twenty consecutive years, and has been a Community Chest agency since 1934. During 1953 VNA made nearly 30,000 visits to provide community-wide bedside nursing care and health supervision under medical direction. Help is given to the sick who are unable to pay for nursing service or to those who need part-time nursing care only, and fees are based on ability to pay.

Outdoor Picnic Will Honor Woodlawn Hospital Patients

Woodlawn Hospital on Harry Hines Boulevard, the unit of the City-County Hospital System which is devoted to the treatment of tuberculosis, will be the scene of a rare patient experiment at 5:30 p. m. Thursday.

No test-tubes, X rays or drug injections will be involved because the experiment is of a recreational, rather than of a medical, nature.

For the first time, Woodlawn patients will be honored guests at a real outdoor picnic, with all the home-cooked trimmings.

Bathrobes and housecoats will be the fashionable patio garb for the seventy-five patients given permission to attend by Dr. Hal Dewlett, resident physician.

The picnic is being provided by the Women's Auxiliary of the Dallas City-County Hospital System and the Dallas Save-A-Life League, headed by Mrs. J. Franklin Reeves and Mrs. Abe Berger as presidents, with Mrs. William Crawford and Mrs. Joseph H. Berger as chairmen of the respective organization's Woodlawn committees.

Mrs. C. J. Moore, of the auxiliary, will be on hand to help Mrs. Reeves and Mrs. Crawford with serving, and Mrs. Israel Cohen and Mrs. Maurice Schackman from the league, will assist Mrs. Berger.

All arrangements for the picnic have been made with the co-operation of Mrs. Anna Koerth, Woodlawn superintendent, and Miss Mary Callan, occupational therapist.

Menu preparations are divided between the auxiliary and the league, with the first furnishing barbecued beef, baked beans, salad and pickles and the second bringing buns, potato chips, ice cream and homemade cakes. The league has also secured a \$25 donation from husbands of the members, to help out with such necessary incidentals as paper plates and the like.

Musical entertainment on the lawn will be provided by Fred Casares and his Mexican Fiesta band, arranged through the courtesy of William J. Harris, president of the Musician's Union, Local 147.

Although the Thursday occasion is the first picnic ever scheduled for Woodlawn, both the Women's Auxiliary and the Save-A-Life League have been active for many years with patient services at the hospital.

The auxiliary was organized in 1940 for the purpose of actively supporting patient-assistance programs at Parkland Hospital, Woodlawn, and the Convalescent Home for the Aged located at Hutchins, the three units of the Dallas City-County Hospital System.

At Woodlawn, the auxiliary has provided movie projectors and screens, electric water fountains, lawn furniture and furnishings for the patients' recreation room and the nurses home. They maintain a library for the patients and sponsor subscriptions to most of the leading magazines. They were instrumental in starting the Wheeze, a monthly patient-written magazine.

The auxiliary also provides a Christmas party each year, with

presents for each patient and arrangements for music and other entertainment.

In 1944 the auxiliary voted to support an occupational therapy program at Woodlawn and secured the services of a professional occupational therapist, paying her salary for two and a half years and buying the materials used in the program. The demonstration proved so successful and was so beneficial to the patients that at that time the hospital board included the OT salary in the regular budget. The auxiliary has continued to furnish the materials.

The auxiliary has enlisted the support of many civic organizations, church groups and interested individuals who have in turn provided innumerable patient comforts and services for Woodlawn. The Dallas Save-A-Life League was also organized in 1940, with a charter membership of thirteen, now grown to more than 1,000. Its chief project is raising funds for the City of Hope in Duarte, California.

Although all funds raised by the Save-A-Life League go to the City of Hope, members of the league contribute their services to local causes, including Woodlawn Hospital, which has been a project of the league for many years.

Until the scheduling of Thursday's picnic, the league's patient activities were centered largely around the Christmas season. At different times they have given radios, pajamas and robes as well as smaller items for patient comfort.

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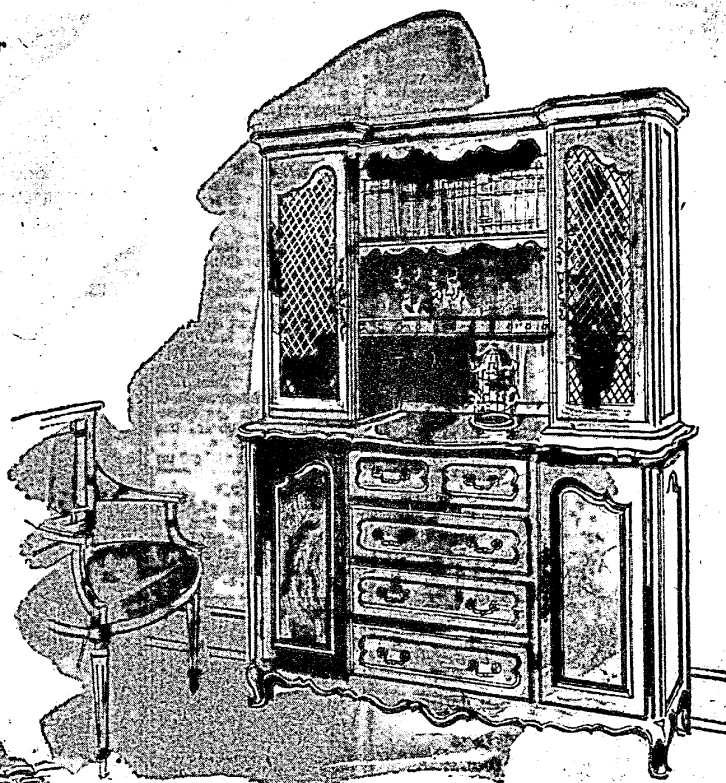
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
